I CAN CHOOSE TO BE FAITHFUL LIKE ENOCH AND NOAH WERE BY SPENDING TIME WITH GOD AND OBEYING HIS VOICE.

"Therefore know that the Lord your God, He is God, the faithful God who keeps covenant and mercy for a thousand generations with those who love Him and keep His commandments" (Deuteronomy 7:9, NKJV).

WORD OF THE WEEK: FAITHFUL:

Being committed and loyal to someone, no matter what. (Who is faithful to you? Whom are you faithful to?)

This week's lesson is based on the story of Noah, as found in Genesis 5-7. Some insights have also been drawn from *Patriarchs and Prophets*, pp.80-103, and *The Story of Redemption*, pp. 57-69, to enhance this lesson.

NOAH BUILDS AN

SUNDAY AFTER THE FALL

We don't know how long it was after Abel died that Adam and Eve had another son, but they had many, many children. Later these children grew up and had many children of their own. Soon there were hundreds and thousands of people on the earth!

One of Adam and Eve's children was Seth. How old was Adam when Seth was born, and what does the Bible tell us about Seth? READ GENESIS 5:3. Although Adam and Eve had many, many more children, it was Seth's family that Jesus would eventually be born into.

Adam lived for 930 years, and in this time, he faithfully told all of his children and grandchildren what it was like living in perfect Eden, and about the sad day they had disobeyed God. They could even go to the gates of Eden to see the angels guarding the garden. Adam told the story of his fall and how very important it was to follow God. But not many people listened. Cain's family became proud, mean, and selfish. They hurt themselves and others in terrible ways.

God loved every single one of Adam's descendants, but in the same way that He wouldn't make Adam and Eve obey Him in the Garden of Eden, He also let people decide if they wanted to be faithful to Him or not.

THINK! ... THEN TALK ABOUT IT:

• Do you think it would have been easy or hard to be faithful to God at that time? Why?

PRAY: You may like to pray...

- · For God to help you to want to be faithful to Him
- · For your family, and your cousins, uncles, aunts, etc.

Do: Go for a walk in nature as a family and choose a special place you can come to every day this week to pray. (If there is nowhere nearby, choose somewhere in your home.)

MONDAY

C in had spread like a bad sickness on the new earth, but Uthere was one special man named Enoch, who was Seth's great-great-great-grandson. Enoch loved God so much and was kind and humble. He chose God's way as his way. The Bible says that "Enoch walked with God" (Genesis 5:22). God helped Enoch to be kind and gentle, and gave him a strong, wise, and growing mind.

Enoch started preaching about God's love to anyone who would listen, and he also pleaded with them to follow God and stop doing wrong. Sometimes he would go away where it was guiet to pray and be with God, and his face would shine when he came back to preach again.

WALKING WITH GOD

After Enoch had walked with God for 300 years, what happened? READ GENESIS 5:24. Yes, God took Enoch to heaven! Just imagine how Enoch felt when he saw his best Friend,

The people living at this time were very tall and strong like Enoch, but most of them were not good and kind like him. They were violent and selfish. They took what God had given and used it to make themselves look good by taking the best things for themselves-gems and gold to become rich and wood to build better houses. They made beautiful gardens for their idols and did whatever they wanted to do without thinking of how it hurt God,

THINK! ... THEN TALK ABOUT IT:

 What would it look like for you to • How hard is it for you to follow

FAMILY PRAYER: Try a popcorn prayer, where each family member prays one sentence (in any order and as many times as you like): Pray your thanks, ask for forgiveness, ask requests, and pray for others. Finish by asking God to be close to your family as you walk with Him.

TUESDAY

PAPENT FAITH TALK: If possible, share with your child when you first remember knowing God was in your life. How old were you? What was it like to know and see God in your life?

> **PRAY**: Kneel down and pray together. Remember that you talk to the same God that Noah talked to. Pray . . .

- To have time to listen to God and read His Word.
- For a trusting, faithful heart, like Noah's.

Do: God planned to wash the world clean of everything bad. Think about this as you help your family by washing the dishes clean after a meal one day this week. If a family member dries the dishes, you might like to tell them today's part of the story.

GOD CALLS A HELPER

t had been more than a thousand years since God had made our beautiful world. God tried to turn people's hearts and minds back to Him again and again, but only a few had listened and responded to His voice (see Genesis 6:5, 11-13). How did God feel about what was happening? **READ GENESIS 6:6.**

God realized that He needed to stop wickedness from spreading like a deadly virus. He would send a flood to cover the whole world. Water would cover the houses, the land, and even the tallest mountains.

God loved all people, and He wanted to warn them about the Flood. He needed a faithful man to help Him, and He chose Noah, for Noah "was a just man," and he "walked with God" (Genesis 6:9).

God told Noah about His plans, and Noah listened carefully. He told God that he would do whatever He asked. God told him to build an ark and explained exactly how to do it. He told him its size and shape, the type of wood to use, and how to put it together. It needed to be almost as strong as stone, because there would be a terrible storm. The ark would have one big door on one side, and rooms for both people and animals. Everyone who chose to go through that door and into the ark would be safe from the flood.

THINK! THEN TALK ABOUT IT:

- How did you listen to or talk to God today?
- God likes to talk to grown-ups, but He also loves to talk to children like you! God knows your heart, and He sees your hurts and joys—everything that's on your mind! God loves it when you talk to Him—He loves to listen to you! Talking with God as you would talk to a friend is what prayer really is.

WEDNESDAY WORKING FAITHFULLY

Noah drew God's plans for the ark, and then he started to work. Strong workmen came to help cut down tall trees that were almost as hard as rock. Other men carefully lined up the wooden boards, and then sealed them with pitch so the ark wouldn't leak. Noah carefully followed everything God had told him. He built the boat exactly as God had said. How many windows and decks did the ark have? READ GENESIS 6:16.

Years went by, and all the workers could see the huge boat taking shape. It was long-longer than four football fields placed end to end and as tall as a five-story building! As the workers came, Noah told them—and anyone else who came to see the ark—about God's plan to wash the world. Noah was faithful. He worked and preached and built and obeyed, for 120 years. That's a lot of birthdays! The Bible says that "Noah did everything that God commanded him" (Genesis 6:22, ICB). Walking with God every day helped him to be faithful.

Noah's sons, Shem, Ham, and Japheth, and his grandfather, Methuselah, as well as many others, helped build the ark. Methuselah was the oldest man who ever lived on this earth, and he died when he was 969 years old, a little while before the rains came. As long as they lived, people who loved God warned others about the flood.

God hoped that every single person would choose to love and follow Him. Every person had a chance to hear God's message, make a choice, and be safe.

As the people worked, Noah's family collected food such as apples and potatoes, rice and peas, raisins and carrots-all kinds of food! They carefully stored large amounts of food, seeds, and grains on the ark. They would need them when the rain came.

THINK! ... THEN TALK ABOUT IT:

• Do you think Noah liked all the jobs he had to do? What does Genesis 6:22 tell us about how he worked?



PRAY: Kneel down and pray together. Pray for a heart to help others, the way Noah and the workers did.

Po: Build a fort and pretend it's an ark. Gather toys to put in your ark and imagine what you would need to prepare to "live" in your ark for more than a year. Then, in your fort, read the story from vour Bible.

[FOR YOU, PARENTS]; Be

encouraged that your work as a mother or father is of eternal significance, despite how busy your life may be or how tired you may feel right now. You may wish you had an army of workers to help you (as did Noah!), but have peace knowing that when you nurture your child's walk with God, you are doing the most important work in the world. Have courage; God will be your help and strength (Isaiah 41:10).

THURSDAY

TRUSTING HIS WORD

For the last time, Noah begged the people to trust God and come into the ark. Imagine Noah's voice echoing through the valley as he pleaded with the people again to believe God's words. Imagine the crowds mocking him: *What a crazy man! How could the whole world be covered with water? Water never fell from the sky!* Noah had heard this for years and years, but he still believed every word that God had said.

Suddenly the people stopped laughing. Their eyes opened wide in surprise. What was happening? *PEAD GENESIS* **7:2, 3.** Animals plodded and pranced toward the ark! In twos and sevens, they spilled out of the woods, across the fields, over the hills, and went quietly, obediently, into the ark. Birds came, too, flapping through the ark's door. For seven days they kept coming and coming—led by angels that no one could see.

Imagine Noah climbing the ramp leading to the ark's door, his voice echoing across the valley one last time, asking all to choose God and be safe. He waited. No one came.

The Bible says, "Then the LORD said to Noah, 'Come into the ark, you and all your household, because I have seen that you are righteous before Me in this generation' " (Genesis 7:1).

Just eight people obeyed God and went into the ark: Noah, his wife, and their sons—Shem, Ham, Japheth—and their wives. Only eight people were faithful and trusted God's words.

Then the boat's huge door started to close! Strong hands, invisible to everyone, pushed it shut. Yes, God had closed the door, and not even the strongest man could open it.

Though so sad about what would happen, God loved how Noah and his family had faithfully obeyed Him.

THINK! ... THEN TALK ABOUT IT:

- Why were the animals in twos and sevens? (Read about it in Genesis 7:2.)
- Why is it so hard to stand up for what's right?
- God has always wanted to draw people (us!) close to Himself. In His love, He still invites us to come to Him to be safe from the stormy troubles in our lives. He offers to carry our worries and burdens (Matt. 11:28-30). There is plenty of room inside His ark of protection and comfort.

SAFE IN THE STORM

For seven days it didn't rain. Oh, how the people outside the ark scoffed and laughed at Noah and his family. *How wrong the old man was!* they must have thought. But Noah and his family patiently waited inside the ark, praying to God and encouraging each other, trusting that the flood would come just as God had said.

What happened after seven days? **READ GENEDIS 7:10, 11.** Then, on the eighth day, dark clouds smothered the sky. Lightning flashed, and thunder roared. The people had never seen anything like it! They were terrified!

Huge raindrops began to fall, and water exploded out of the ground. The people outside the ark watched as the terrible storm ruined their beautiful houses and their idols. All of a sudden, they realized that Noah had been right. God *had* been right!

Some of the people pounded on the door of the ark—but it was closed tight. Some ran to the top of the highest hills to escape the water. Others climbed tall trees. But gradually water covered the whole world, and the ark was the only thing that could be seen on top of all the water. Angels hovered over the ark to keep it safe as the storm raged.

The Bible says that God "destroyed all living things which were on the face of the ground: both man and cattle, creeping thing and bird of the air. They were destroyed from the earth. Only Noah and those who were with him in the ark remained alive" (Genesis 7:23).

Inside the ark, Noah and his family and all the animals were safe. They may have felt a little scared, but inside the ark was the safest place to be. Out of the thousands of people who were living on the earth, only eight chose to follow God. How happy Noah and his family were that they had walked with God, listened to Him for all those years, and had done what He had asked them to do!

Besides Noah's family and the animals in the ark, only one other thing was saved—the beautiful Garden of Eden. God took it to heaven before the flood started, to keep it safe for Adam, Eve, and all of us to enjoy on the brand-new earth after Jesus comes again (see Rev. 2:7; 22:1, 2).

THINK!... THEN TALK ABOUT IT:

- When have you listened to and obeyed God, even when others haven't?
- How can you be strong to stand for God even if most other people don't? (See Deut. 31:6; Ps. 71:2)

PRAY TOGETHEP: To trust God, because He will do what He promises to do, and to be brave and to stand up for God.

FUN FACTS: Elephants eat about 200 to 500 pounds (about 90 to 225 kilograms) of food each day. Horses eat about 15 to 20 pounds (about 7 to 9 kilograms) of food each day. The animals in the ark probably needed much less food because they were in their cages and couldn't be active.

Po: Find out how much other animals eat in a day.

FRIDAY NIGHT

PARENT FAITH TALK

Tell your child about a time you've listened to a warning from God, or from a parent or grandparent, and you were glad you did so.

SING, LISTEN, OR COMPOSE

Recite your Memory Verse and think about the things you have learned about this week, such as walking with God, listening to God, trusting God, being a faithful worker for God, helping others, and being brave to stand up for Jesus.

As you think of these themes, what song comes to your mind? Consider singing or listening to it. Or compose a song of your own.

PRAY

Pray a simple prayer, asking God to help you to trust Him, believe what He says, and be a faithful follower like Noah.

REFLECTION QUESTIONS

About This Week's Story (You may want to add these reflections to your Family Journal)

- What does this story tell me about God?
- What is God's invitation to me in this story?

SABBATH SPECIAL

WILL YOU PREACH?

More than 170 years ago God asked a man to preach for Him, just as he had asked Noah. Instead of preaching about a big flood and finding safety in an ark, God asked this man to preach about God's love and the second coming of Jesus.

His name was John Loughborough ("LUFF-burro"), and he was not quite 17 years old. He knew God wanted him to preach, even though he was young. But when he looked at himself, he wondered who would ever listen to him! His trousers were hand-me-downs from a taller man, so they flopped around his ankles. The coat he wore was just an overcoat that had been cut off at the bottom. With only \$1 in his pocket, how was he to buy nice clothes? He couldn't, but he set off to preach anyway.

Thinking he needed some preaching practice, John began to preach in a small place where he didn't know anyone. He shouldn't have worried, for the people were blessed by what they heard. One man gave him \$3, others gave him \$5 worth of books to sell, and others encouraged him because he was a good preacher and could explain the Bible so well.

Moving on to another village, he rented a church and put up some posters to let people know he would be preaching for three nights. Pretty soon word got around that a boy was going to preach! Imagine John's surprise when he found the church full to overflowing that first night, and then again the next evening! He was so glad that people had come to hear about God.

But there was one man who wasn't happy, and he tried to cause trouble. He argued and said that John wasn't preaching what the Bible said. Before long he was very embarrassed because young John could easily show him lots of Bible texts to prove the truths he preached.

Over the years John Loughborough became a very well-known preacher who worked hard for God in America, England, and Europe. He preached in churches, schools, tents, people's homes, and even under shady trees. Sometimes people tried to do cruel things to him, but God always kept him safe.

He is remembered as a faithful Seventh-day Adventist pioneer who worked hard with James and Ellen White and other church leaders to tell people about God and His truth for this time.

Enoch walked with God. Noah worked for God. John Loughborough preached for God.

We can, too.

What can you do for God?

When we walk with God by choosing to love Him and live for Him, He will show us what we can do for Him.

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
